## Nothing Short Of A Miracle

I started using substances at 18 years old due to a medical condition that caused a doctor to prescribe me pain pills for a solid year. By the time I was 19 I had a full blown addiction that would end up taking me places I never imag-ined or would wish upon my worst enemy. The next 20 Years would be filled with institutions, prisons, and despair. When I was 39 Years old, I had three kids having just given birth to my last one right after getting out of jail. I had finally EOS (ended my last sentence.) The state was wanting my rights to all 3 kids and I had noth-ing but this addiction that kept screaming my name. I was tired, scared and I wanted my ba-bies. I could not hardly breathe without them.

Finally, I was able to get into the Birmingham Fellowship House where I stayed 90 days. This is where I met Mark Litvine who introduced me to the R.O.S.S. Program. All I knew is that I wanted what Mark had and I wanted to be that for other people! When I left Treatment, I went back to North Alabama. I got my mom, packed up everything mom owned & what little I had and moved back to Birmingham. We stayed in hotels, and I worked day labor jobs until we were able to move into a family members house. The way God showed up in my life is nothing short of a miracle without Him leading my way there is no way I would be sitting here today! todav!

I joined R.O.S.S. as an intern in the Recovery Community Services Program & started doing my classes all while doing what the courts wanted of me. Because of me going to treat-ment I was able to stop the termination of my rights! I gained custody of all three of my kids with the case completely closed! (Continued at top of nace) top of page)

I gained my Certified Recovery Support Specialist Certification and was hired on full time with the R.O.S.S. 24/7 Helpline call center! I also now work as a Peer Specialist at the Aletheia House! It amazes me when I think of where I come from. Life hasn't been easy some-times & can be a struggle but at the end of each day I can kiss my kid's goodnight. It makes every-thing I've been through worth it!

**RCSP? Recovery Community Services** Program? Originally this is what I thought when I entered R.O.S.S. to volunteer. After being informed of what the program was it was easy to join & begin training to help others with their own recovery. The openness of the approach to recovery within the program is more than beneficial to everyone at any stage of recovery. Also, offering additional support groups, alcohol and drug free activities, and Peer/Recovery mentors for One-On-One counseling was an approach that was refreshing and new. With the focus placed on the individual, their recovery time, background & beliefs. This means there is a better chance of success.

Within the 4 Phases there is so much room for growth. Starting with Phase 1 you can assess who you are and what you need to work on to maintain recovery. Each Phase prepares you for the next with emphasis on growth and maintaining the Peers best chance at continued recovery. All the possibilities of a life after addiction during recovery are represented. Including the following; support groups, educational classes, and workforce development which expands the Peers world of recovery. Providing all of these services at one location is a wonderful asset to the community of recovery as a whole. Not only do the Peers benefit but also the Peer Mentors benefit as well.

Along with all the services provided the program prepares you with the training to become a Certified Recovery Support Specialist certified by the Alabama Department Of Mental Health, With this Certification a Peer can provide the education they received to others. A Peer in the program can choose from training in the Helpline Call Center to shadowing as an Outreach Specialist. There are other training opportunities as well which prepares the Peer with the abilities to not only be hired by R.O.S.S. but also hold other positions in the community. Holding this high standard only helps to advance R.O.S.S., the community, and the individuals we serve through all aspects of Recovery. During my time in this program I have furthered my recovery. I have learned & grown. I wish to continue on my path of recovery to provide Hope and be an example of what can be accomplished by the Recovery Community Service Program. RCSP!
